PARK CENTURY'S FIRST COMMUNITY EARTH DAY FESTIVAL

This spring, our Student Council, with the help of the 8th graders, hosted our first Park Century Community Earth Day Festival. On April 29, students and faculty started their day by gathering in Panther Parties and visiting several community project stations set up in our parking lot to celebrate Earth Day. Festivities included planting succulents and seeds, building structures out of recyclable goods donated by community members, and painting a mural on the back of our building.

Our wonderful Parents Association teamed up with our Student Council to provide a coffee cart for the event, inviting parents to come and enjoy a cup of coffee while students completed their Earth-centered art projects. As part of a



Student Council-led initiative, all funds raised from the coffee cart went toward the installation of an ecofriendly filtered water fountain in our school that can fill reusable water bottles, eradicating the use of plastic water bottles on our campus. Our PA also sold custom Park Century steel reusable water bottles to help raise funds for the new fountain.

PARK CENTURY COMMUNITY ART PROJECT - THE STORY OF US

Throughout the school year, faculty have incorporated our Council program into Panther Parties, our community character education program that focuses on the values of The Panther Way: Kindness, Respect, Responsibility, Cooperation, Honesty, and Resilience. In February, all students gathered in our gym after their usual Monday Morning Assembly to divide into their Panther Parties and hold a Council on the theme of Respect. After a brief introduction from faculty members explaining how we must learn to respect ourselves before we can fully understand how to respect others, students discussed their names as part of their individual identities and stories, taking turns saying their full name, their name meaning, and sharing the story of how they got their name.

After their discussion, each student and teacher made name flags to tell the story of their names through art. Using colors they felt best portrayed their individual identities, they added words or phrases to describe



themselves, symbolic representations of their families or cultures, or drawings of animals and plants they felt represented them. The finished name flags were collected and strung together as a community art project. As our 8th grade class hung these flags from our atrium overlooking the Lower School hallway, 4th and 5th grade students searched for their flags from below, pointing excitedly when they found their unique stories embedded in the banner - a visual representation of how individual stories become woven together as important, respected, and celebrated parts that form a greater whole: community.

SPRING GALA: A GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

On Saturday, May 11th, our community celebrated Park Century's 50th Anniversary with our Spring Gala in honor of our Golden Anniversary. The evening, emceed by PCS parents Dan Bucatinsky and Don Roos, began with cocktail hour and a silent auction on the rooftop at The London Hotel, followed by dinner in the ballroom featuring performances from PCS parent Katey Sagal as well as The PCS Mamas and Papas- a band made up of parents and faculty! Current and alumni parents, faculty members, cherished alumni, trustees, and long-time friends of Park Century enjoyed the premiere of our 50th Anniversary Tribute film created by PCS parent CJ and Mike Bigelow, a rousing Live Auction, and a remarkable and unprecedented Paddle Raise towards the Panther's Play Campaign to "Put the Park in Park Century," raising more than \$472,000 and getting us that much closer to building our outdoor play space.
